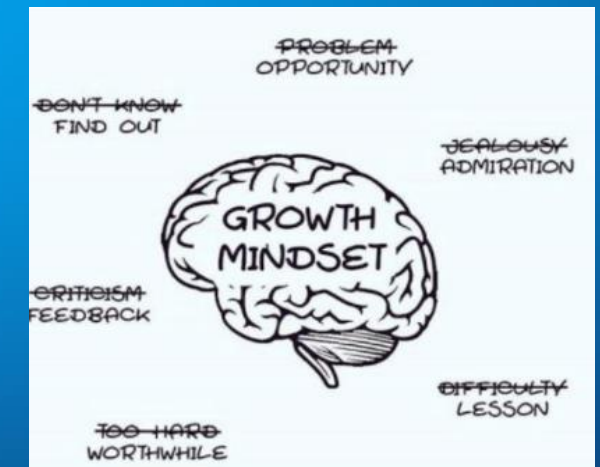

# Advisory Purpose and Non-Purpose

## Purpose

- **Serve as a critical thought partner in assessing systems related to buildings, boundaries, and programs.**
- Serve as a critical thought partner in assessing DCSD's current student assignment procedures and policies.
- Provide impartial recommendations suited to dismantling structural inequities.
- **Use data to make informed decisions and recommendations.**
- Recommend ways for DCSD to become fiscally efficient.
- Review and recommend ways to **reimagine** DCSD programs and offerings so all students have a quality education.
- Recommend boundaries, buildings, and programs suited for the current and projected enrollment.

## Non-Purpose of the Advisory

- To make **final decisions** regarding policy or standard operating procedures related to DCSD.
- **To determine the daily operations of schools or programs.**
- To direct DCSD to make specific changes within the purview of the Board of Education.
- **To make decisions that only impact your children or your community.**



# Goals, Outcomes and Big Questions

## Vision

To reimagine DCSD as it relates to **programs, boundaries, and buildings** using data **holistically**, with a cadence to review every **5 years** to align with E-SPLOST.

This comprehensive planning process will help position **ALL** of our students upon graduation to **Enroll, Employ, engage in Entrepreneurship, and Enlist.**

## Outcome (this session)

# SAP Defined and Process

## **What is student assignment?**

Student Assignment is a process that aligns the values of the community and district to assign students to schools and programs, review boundary lines, and determine school opening or closing.

# SAP Advisory Committee Defined and Meeting Expectations

The SAP Committee will assist in the reimagining of DeKalb County School District. The advisory committee will review the District's policies, programs, boundaries, and building usages.

The SAP advisory committee will triangulate data from multiple sources. This will include (a) community and district stakeholders, (b) enrollment and projection data, and (c) operation and finance data to develop recommendations that meet the vision.

This committee will use several decision-making processes to reduce emotional drivers and elevate critical thinking, sound decision-making, and analytics.

This is about an 18-month long commitment.

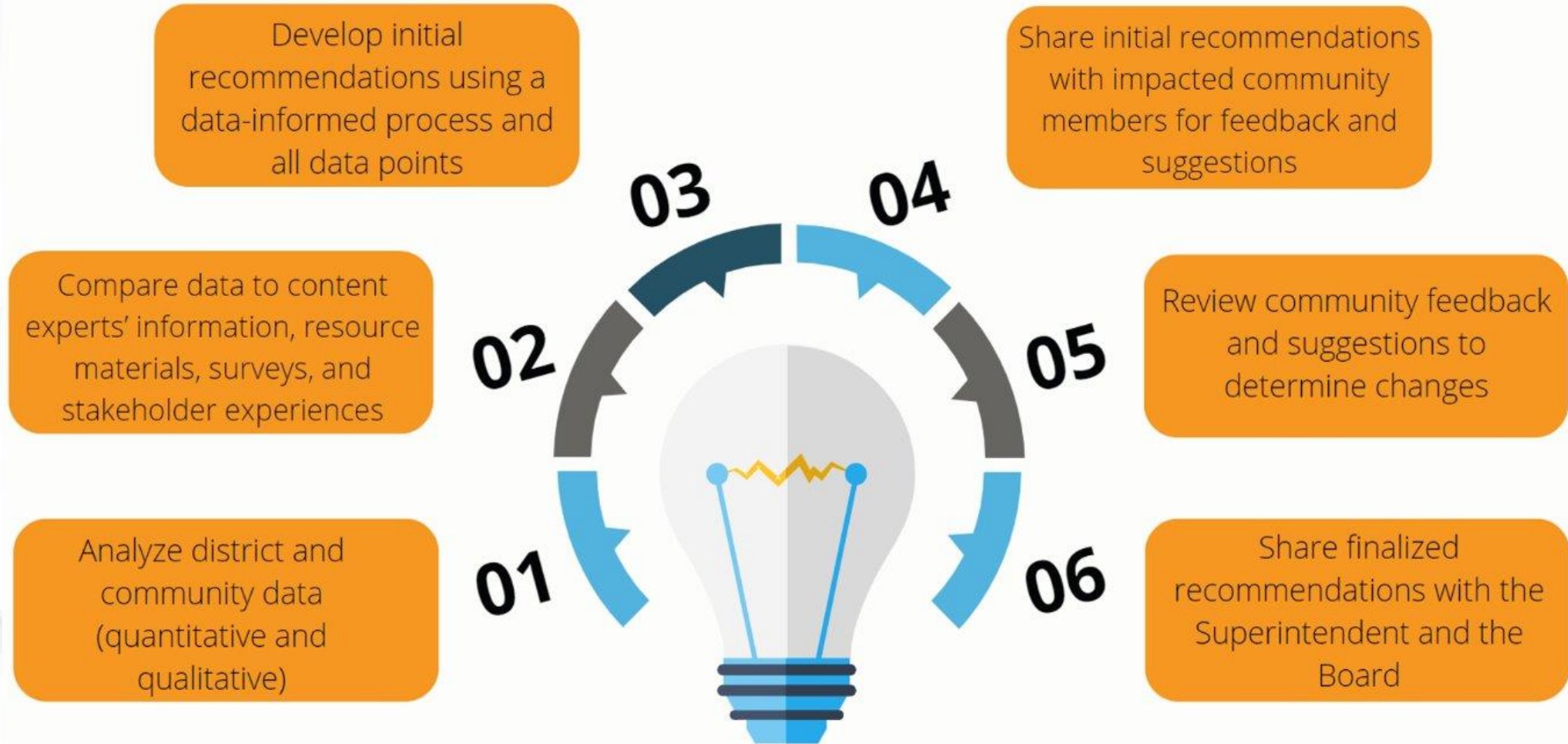

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# DeKalb History 1873 - 2024

DeKalb County School District (DCSD) was established in 1873 when residents raised \$4,200 to open public schools. Named for Baron Johann DeKalb, a German soldier who aided the colonists in their fight for independence, DeKalb County, Georgia, is the community served by the DeKalb County School District. DeKalb County School District is Georgia's third largest school system, covering 257 square miles.

The DeKalb County School System (DCSS) had been operating a “dual system” of schools for its citizens. The system’s only response to Brown v. Board of Education was to institute a building program to upgrade the quality of schools designated for African Americans – in effect, finally complying with the Plessy v. Ferguson decision of 1896, which required “separate but equal” facilities. Some residents continued fighting for equality, eventually leading to policy changes and more integrated schools through programming. DeKalb schools largely remained segregated.

Today, in 2024, The District serves over 92,000 students, 138+ schools and centers, and 14K employees, including 6,600 teachers. Students and parents speak over 166+ languages and represent over 155+ nations. School choice options are available in nearly 50 schools to include theme, magnet, dual language, IB, charter, and Montessori options.

# DCSD School Desegregation Timeline

Brown v. Board of Education (**1954**)

In this milestone decision, the Supreme Court ruled that separating children in public schools based on race was unconstitutional.

In **1966**, the DCSS instituted a “freedom of choice” plan, which allowed students to transfer, on a voluntary basis, to another school.

In **1969**, the U.S. District Court for the Northern District of Georgia imposed a desegregation plan upon the DeKalb schools and retained authority to oversee the implementation of the plan.

**1965** The system’s only response to Brown v. Board of Education was to institute a building program to upgrade the quality of schools designated for African Americans. DeKalb agreed in writing to desegregation plans.

Litigation in DeKalb County, Georgia over school desegregation began in **1968** with the filing of a class action lawsuit against the DeKalb County Board of Education to end the practice of racial segregation (*Pitts v. Cherry*).

The DCSD was in litigation for school desegregation from **1968 to 1997**.

**1969**

"freedom of choice" plan abolished and neighborhood school attendance plan that had been developed.

**1978-1979**

In this class action lawsuit parents of black school children challenge that portion of the district court's desegregation plan which does not require the DeKalb County school system to provide transportation for kindergarten children who elect to participate in the voluntary majority-to-minority transfer program.

**1989** DeKalb remained under complete court supervision until full integration was achieved. They met the requirements for student assignments, transportation, physical facilities, and extracurricular activities, but not faculty assignments and resource allocations.

In **1972**, the DCSS started a program to further desegregation in the county called the **Majority to Minority (M-to-M)** program, it allowed students who were members of the majority race in their neighborhood school to transfer to a school in which their race was a minority group.

The Circuit Court ruled in **1985** that any of the school's expansion plans had to be implemented in a way that "further desegregation and helps eliminate the effects of the previous dual school system" and sent the case back to the District Court to evaluate the "segregation" effects of the school board's expansion plan.

**1997**  
**DeKalb County Schools**  
**were declared integrated and therefore**  
**the school board no longer**  
**required judicial supervision.**

# DCSD Programs

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# DCSD Program Development

Between 1972 and 2000, many of the DCSD programs were developed based on desegregation laws and the M-to-M policy. There were several variations of how and which programs were developed, but many were in response to integration. We have also implemented best practice programs that meet community members' needs. There are currently no consistent metrics to create new programs or analyze current ones in DeKalb.

# E-SPLOST

## What is ESPLOST ( **S**pecial **P**urpose **L**ocal **O**ption **S**ales **T**ax for education)?

Georgia enacted the special purpose local option sales tax for education (ESPLOST) in 1996, giving school districts in the state the opportunity, with voter approval, to adopt a 1¢ sales tax with revenue earmarked for capital outlay.



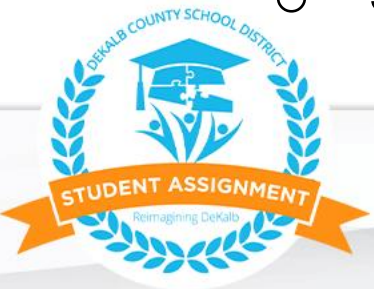
