Career Technical and Agricultural Education (CTAE) *South is stand alone Grades 11th and 12th	Career Technical and Agricultural Education (CTAE) is Career Technical Agricultural Education (CTAE) is the cornerstone for preparing students to be "College and Career Ready." CTAE integrates core academic knowledge with technical and occupational skills to prepare students for post-secondary education and the workforce. During academic advisement, all students select an education pathway, one of which is CTAE. During the junior and senior years, students in the CTAE pathway can attend Tech North or South to complete pathway courses and, in some cases, earn certificates.
*Elizabeth Andrews Grades 10th-12th	Elizabeth Andrews High School is a non-traditional secondary program that provides an educational opportunity to high school students who wish to accelerate the manner in which they complete the remaining required units for graduation. This non-traditional secondary program provides an educational opportunity to high school students wishing to enter college or join the work force early, to students who need to make up courses for graduation, to dropouts seeking education while gainfully employed or to married students. Elizabeth Andrews enrollment is available to DeKalb County residents 16 years of age who have completed 6 units of credit which includes 3 credits from the content core areas such as: English, Math, Science, Social Studies, and World Language.

*Fernbank Science Center STT Grade 9	The Scientific Tools and Techniques Program (STT) is a challenging, fast-paced, one-semester program designed to familiarize 9th grade students with the tools and techniques of scientific inquiry. STT students are involved in rigorous science curriculum and take an array of life and environmental science modules taught by instructors who are field specialists. Classes are held in our planetarium, observatory, greenhouse, and laboratories that are equipped with state-of-the-art scientific instruments. Students will also take several field trips. In one semester students take two accelerated high school science courses: STT Biology and STT Environmental Science.
*International Student Center Lab Grades 7th and 8th	The International Student Center serves students in 7th and 8th grade students who spend up to two years learning to speak, read, and write in English, across all content areas to support their future success in their neighborhood high schools.

Students have the opportunity to learn skills directly in the workplace through Work-Based Learning internships at DeKalb County Fleet Management, Fernbank Science Center, Walmart and other area businesses.

Magnet

Parent volunteer hours are a vital part of the program. All traditional theme schools require a mandatory uniform dress code. Specific details can be found on each theme school's website. The Magnet Program for High Achievers is designed to challenge students who will benefit from a fast-paced, stimulating environment. The program will provide a rigorous interdisciplinary course of study that meets the needs of highly motivated students. Special emphasis is placed on preparing students to succeed through higher-order critical thinking skills, creative and cooperative teaching, fluency in a second language, extensive computer-based and multimedia instruction, and the infusion of multicultural literature. Technology is integrated into the interdisciplinary curriculum. Core subjects are taught at an accelerated level with a variety of early Advanced Placement (AP) opportunities being offered to ninth through twelfth grade students. 





International Baccalaureate – Middle

The IB Middle Years Programme (MYP), for students aged 11-14, recognizes that students in this age group are particularly sensitive to social and cultural influences and are struggling to define themselves and their relations to others. The programme helps students develop the skills to cope with this period of uncertainty. It encourages them to think critically and independently, to work collaboratively, and to take a disciplined approach to studying. The MYP seeks to give students an international perspective—to help them become informed about the experiences of people and cultures throughout the world. It also fosters a commitment to help others and to act as a responsible member of the community at the local, national, and international levels.



International Baccalaureate – High School

The IB Program is designed for **students who desire to prepare to earn an IB Diploma** (at Druid Hills, Martin Luther King Jr., or Tucker High Schools) or an **IB Career-related Certificate (at Tucker High only**). This is a rigorous, advanced, and challenging program of study. The first two years prepare students to undertake one of the IB programs in grades 11—12. Traditional academic subjects are part of both programs, but they also emphasize the interrelatedness of knowledge and skills through transdisciplinary programs of inquiry. In the Diploma Programme, students are supported by a required course, Theory of Knowledge while they study 6 additional subjects: first language, second language, social studies, mathematics, science and fine arts. Students are required to develop a proficiency in a second language during the program. In the Career-related Programme, students are supported by a required course, Personal and Professional Skills, while they study a full career pathway, two IB Diploma courses, and develop a second language. Students who complete the programs in 12th grade may receive advanced standing in colleges and universities in the United States and around the world.

Other Programs - DeKalb Early College Academy

Established in 2006, DeKalb Early College Academy is the only early college model high school for the DeKalb County School District. Along with our educational partner – Georgia State University at Perimeter College – our students take some of their upper-division courses on a college campus. Students receive high school units toward graduation and post-secondary credits simultaneously. Upon completion of the program, students will earn their high school diploma, at least 30 hours of college credit hours, and likely a CTAE Pathway certification. Since these 30 hours of college courses are paid with Dual Enrollment state funding, there are minimal costs incurred by scholars and their families. However, about 70% of our scholars have chosen to continue past the 30 allotted hours and we continue to provide them will world-class educational support.




